

Ashby School Remembers...

Remembrance events at Ashby School were featured on BBC East Midlands Today after the school was gifted 122 poppies by Acres Engineering, a local company run by former student Luke Parker (pictured below).

The metal poppies, which were planted in the lawn on the Sixth Form campus, each symbolised a former student who lost their life in conflict.





Across the school, students and staff fell silent at 11am on the Friday ahead of Remembrance Sunday.

In form time, a slideshow reminded all members of the school community about the horrors of war and the sacrifices made by soldiers and their families.

Some students took part in lunchtime craft sessions to make poppies for a Remembrance display in the library (pictured above).

Headteacher Dr Jude Mellor said: "Showing respect is one of our core values and it takes on an even greater resonance at this time of year."

Cake sales, a basketball shoot out and the return of 'sponge a teacher' all helped to raise funds for Children in Need.

Staff and students could also choose to come to school in 'non uniform', in exchange for a donation to the charity.

The fundraiser, which took place over both lunch breaks, was one of the first events to be organised and run by the new Student Council.

Year 12 **sports leaders** got an added boost when they were all rewarded with golden tickets after hosting a multi skills festival for local primary schools and receiving so many positive comments! The event also helped students to develop their understanding of what it takes to be an effective sports leader.

Faculty Focus on...Maths



The six highest scorers achieved gold in the 90 minute, multiple choice challenge including Year 13 student Alice Cleaver, who was named 'best in school' for her impressive score of 99 out of 100. She will be joined in the next round of the competition by fellow students Rob Bland, Luke Barrett, Josh Cherrington, Alexander Rodrigues-Orme and Scarlett Pole.

In all, 23 Sixth Form students took part (pictured above, centre). Four achieved silver, while eight picked up bronze. Nathan Priestland was presented with a certificate for being 'best in Year 12'.

Alice Cleaver was also the school's top scorer in this year's Mathematical Olympiad for Girls, which was entered by mathematicians from Years 11, 12 and 13 (some of whom are pictured above, right)

Alice picked up a distinction while there were merits for Hazel Jeffery, Emily Jeans and Ffion Thompson, all in Year 11. Hazel Jeffery was named 'best in Year 11'.

The Intermediate Maths Challenge for Year 10 and 11 students will take place after Christmas.

Students from Years 10, 12 and 13 are also taking part in Ritangle, a national team maths competition, tackling three new questions each week. Ashby's team is working on these at maths club which is held every Wednesday after school.

In Year 11, the results of students' trial exams earlier this term are now being analysed to pinpoint individuals' strengths and weaknesses, helping both students and teachers plan the focus of their work over the next few weeks.

There have also been 'in class' tests for Year 10 to assess progress.

The school's full time maths tutor, Miss Gomez, continues to offer additional support to those who need it in both KS3 and KS4.

In Year 13, the results of trial exams are being used to inform priorities for teaching and learning. A Sixth Form drop in session every Tuesday after school regularly attracts as many as 40 students for help and support on questions and topics of their choice.
