Learn) programme. To encourage a lifelong love of reading, students participate in library sessions once a fortnight and visit the library regularly to choose new books.


Ready, Set, Year 10...

There's been lots of positive energy in Year 10—and that's not just because of the energy topic in physics lessons (pictured right).

Assessments in core subjects have helped to group Year 10 students effectively for science, as well as English and maths. This enables all students to work at a pace and level that's right for them and means that teaching staff can tailor their lessons to help students reach their full potential.

Year 10 students have now been begun their first PE activities of the year, after choosing either a

competitive, recreational or leisure pathway. All Year 10 students take part in three hours of core PE a fortnight as part of the school's commitment to encourage a healthy and active lifestyle.





Year 12s Take Transition in their Stride

Year 12 students have hit the ground running as Sixth Formers, taking advantage of even more opportunities to embrace the school's core values of respect, responsibility and resilience.

Launching later this month, the Sixth Form enrichment programme will give students the chance to take up mentoring and prefecting roles with younger students and to sign up for a range of other activities and qualifications, including the Extended Project Qualification (EPQ) and core maths.

For those who have questions or concerns about their post-16 subject choices, support is available. The first point of contact is Year Team Leader Alan Tsang who works closely with students and their parents to help them arrive at the right outcome. Students can also speak to the school's on site careers advisers.

Faculty Focus on...Science



It's all happening in science!

The school's popular after-school **Science Club** for Year 7 students (pictured above) has fired up for the new term!

The Wednesday night club runs fun, hands-on science sessions to enthuse young scientists and explore the science behind everyday activities.

Eight primary schools competed in our **annual Science Fair** at the end of last term in the hope of winning the coveted Golden Bunsen.

During their visit to Ashby School, the pupils took part in practical science workshops, supported by Sixth Form science students, and got the chance to showcase their own exhibits to staff, parents and students before a winner was chosen.

The event is part of Ashby School's close working relationship with local primary schools. Golden Bunsen winner Esme is now in Year 7 at Ashby School!

New **Head of Physics** Luke Wills is the latest addition to the science faculty. Mr Wills, who has a degree in physics with planetary science and space physics, has been teaching for eight years.

He said: "I am really looking forward to being part of the science team here at Ashby and helping students prosper and come to love the challenges that the many aspects of physics have to offer."

A visit by paramedics from East Midlands Ambulance Service (pictured below) gave students an insight into medical careers and an opportunity to practise some basic first aid. They even got the chance to take a tour of the ambulance and find out more about the equipment on board.

The visit was particularly useful for Sixth Formers considering careers in medicine who were able to speak to the ambulance crew about possible career pathways.

Mock interviews for students looking to pursue a career in medicine will be held later this year—with the help of drama students who will play the part of patients in medical scenarios. The simulated interviews are based on the Multi Mini Interviews (MMIs) used by many medical schools as part of the selection process for new medical students.

Safeguarding Moment

Ashby School is part of Operation Encompass to support students affected by domestic violence.

All staff are trained to understand the purpose of Operation Encompass and what to do if a call or email is received about a student.

Operation Encompass means that our school will be told, prior to the start of the next school day, when police have attended an incident of domestic abuse where there is a child or young person who attends our school who is related to any of those involved in the incident To help keep students safe while out and about, Leicestershire Neighbourhood Watch has produced a range of items, including safety alarms and hi vis accessories.
