Year 10 students have settled well into life at Ashby School, earning their fair share of positive points for observing the school's three Rs (respect, responsibility and resilience).

Sport-loving Year 10 students have also signed up to the school's Sports Leaders programme. They will help to organise and run sporting events for other students and visiting schools, developing valuable personal skills, such as team work and time management.

Year 10 students have been making a key contribution to school decision-making through its Student Council and Student Voice representatives, meeting regularly with staff and other year groups to discuss and influence student issues.

Year 7



The importance of resilience—one of the school's three core values—has been at the heart of careers talks for Year 7 students. Employees from local company Pladis have been into school on several occasions to talk to students about their different job roles.

The school is also partnering with Burton Albion Football Club as part of the Year 7 focus on health and wellbeing. Representatives from the club will deliver a 'Mini Minds' programme, discussing mental, physical and emotional health.

Students continue to be rewarded for their achievements at upholding the school's values. A special film afternoon was held for more than 50 students who've shown the greatest commitment to Showing Respect, Accepting Responsibility and Building Resilience this half term.

Year 12

A busy half term for Year 12 students ended with a week of in-class assessments.

Year 12 Raising Standards Leader George Soszynski is working with Year 12s to ensure they are on track to meet their academic targets, identifying pastoral needs and advising on effective study techniques.

All students are being encouraged to consider their next steps. Forthcoming assemblies will feature visiting speakers from local employers Caterpillar, DHL and Next.

Year 12 students continue to be excellent role models for younger students. About 30 volunteers from Year 12 act as reading buddies for Year 7 students once a week. Others perform prefecting duties in classrooms for other year groups.

Faculty Focus on...Humanities

Business students in Year 10 have been busy designing and producing their own backpacks. They have investigated the costings, revenue and profit involved and conducted their own market research, including identifying a target audience for their product.

Year 11 GCSE business students have been considering ethical behaviour and looking at business case studies of unethical behaviour and its repercussions.

International trading has been the focus for Year 13 students who have studied businesses that have successfully used this strategy to aid expansion.

In **psychology**, Year 10 students have so far explored memory processes and perception and have begun learning about the brain and development.

In Year 11, psychology students have been learning about language development and also non-verbal communication such as eye contact, posture etc. They have discovered how brain scans and neurological damage such as strokes can impact psychological functions. Students are looking forward to learning about mental health in their final topic.

The introduction of a KS4 electronic textbook has proved to be a useful revision tool. There will be a workshop on 31 March to offer students exam tips and advice in preparation for their exams. After school revision sessions run every Monday in H10.

Year 12 psychology students have enjoyed learning about childhood attachments, the causes and treatments for mental health disorders and exploring the topic of social influence. Seven psychology students will attend an enrichment day at the University of Lincoln to find out more about psychology at degree level.

In Year 13, students have learnt about human aggression, romantic relationships and schizophrenia. To prepare for their exams, they are creating revision resources and completing exam questions regularly. A revision workshop on 31 March will be led by Ali Abbas who has worked for the psychology exam board and has lots of advice to offer. Students have also been attending revision sessions every Wednesday (week 1) lunchtime in B13.



In **philosophy and ethics**, Year 7 have been learning about religion, beliefs and values within the new E2L course. This has been taken up with enthusiasm and hopefully will inspire students to study this subject further in the future.

Year 10 students have been studying two major world religions, making connections between these beliefs and practices and evaluating their impact on the world today.

Year 11 students are enjoying getting to grips with ethical issues regarding life, war and peace, crime and punishment, wealth and poverty, and human rights and social justice.

Year 12 and 13 have been studying key philosophical and ethical topics from the Ancient Greeks up to the present day.

In **geography**, Year 11 and 13 students are busy preparing for their final exams More than 40 students attended GCSE geography 'Aim High' revision sessions online to work with Mr Cornell (Head of Geography) on exam technique and case study knowledge.

Meanwhile, all 35 Year 13 A Level students completed their NEA (coursework) to a superb standard. This will be marked and moderated over the coming weeks.

The department is also planning a trip to Iceland in spring 2024 and a Year 10 GCSE fieldwork trip to Birmingham to give students experience of planning coursework in preparation for paper 3 of their GCSE exam.

Year 7 students have now completed their second humanities unit on 'Awesome Africa.' Year 10 GCSE history students have settled in well and demonstrated a real interest and enthusiasm for the new topic of Russian History, Tsardom and Communism.

Year 13 history students have been working really hard on completing their final Non-Examined Assessments, which are worth 20% of their final grade. They will also shortly be visiting Bosworth Battlefield as part of their study of late Medieval History. Mr Clewett, who joined the history department this year, will be attending the Historical Associations' Annual Conference—where the keynote speaker is renowned historian Mary Beard— to gain new insight into curriculum innovation, diversity issues, literacy and Special Educational Needs.
